# **Calendar Description**

An introduction to the functions of information services programs, an examination of policies designed to build materials collections in support of such programs, and an opportunity to become familiar with examples of major reference/information sources. Required course.

### **Objectives**

### General:

To develop a basic understanding of the rationale for various types of reference/information services and resources in libraries.

### Specific:

Upon completion of this course, a student should be able to: identify basic reference/information services, identify basic types of reference/information resources (print and electronic), use basic reference/information resources (print and electronic) to answer reference questions, evaluate basic reference/information resources (print and electronic), conduct a reference interview, discuss the discourse of reference, and discuss the nature of ethics and information work.

### Content

This course is designed to acquaint the student with the basic principles of reference/information services in libraries and to familiarize her/him with a fairly wide range of basic reference/information resources (print and electronic). In addition, attention will be given to the history and theory of reference/information services, and to their organization and administration in different types of libraries. Various techniques used in providing information services will be examined, and problem areas will be discussed.

### **Methods**

Lectures and discussions.
Readings and case studies.
Videos and computer demonstrations.
Small group work.
Work sheets and evaluation.
Guest lectures.
