Description

Directed Research Project (ECON 999) at the University of Alberta serves as a masters-level course that provides guidance for students to complete the research requirement of their MA by conducting independent empirical research in economics. The course will aid students in their presentation and paper writing skills, as well as in the professionalism required of an economist. All enrolled students are expected to participate, present, and produce research over several scheduled intervals throughout the entire semester.

The prerequisites for this course are ECON 503, ECON 581, ECON 598, and ECON 599.

Evaluation

Students enrolled in this course must actively participate in class, present their own research, and submit a final research paper. The purpose of these tools is for you to fully demonstrate your level of understanding of the production of research in economics.

Your numerical grade for the course will be calculated using the following weights:

20.0%	Active Class Participation	(from May 10 th to June 23 rd)
30.0%	Presentations of Research	(from May 10 th to June 23 rd)
50.0%	Final Research Paper	(final papers due by email)

Your letter grade is then determined based on your absolute and relative performance to the rest of the class, with a historical grade point average of ~ 3.15 out of 4.0 (~B+/B).

Active class participation is based on your attendance of classes and contributions made. Treat our time like a language course; we will only use our time to talk about research.

Presentations are your opportunity to defend your research to your peers and instructor. These talks should emulate a department seminar, with questions from your audience.

Your papers will progress in various forms throughout the semester (from portfolios, to presentations, paper drafts, and final papers). To begin, you will show and tell us about every research paper you have written and ideas you would like to pursue (portfolio). You will then begin to pursue the best idea, while providing detail for each ingredient

(1st presentation). Next, you will provide more detail, formatting these ingredients like a typical economics working paper (paper draft) and then into a more formal research synopsis (2nd presentation). Finally, the only form of your research you will submit should be as close to perfection as possible (final paper). Thus, you should be writing, and rewriting, all semester long. Your final paper will be evaluated by the instructor and a second reader who will advise the instructor as to the quality of the paper within its field. Resubmissions are permissible if your grade is not satisfactory, and you request to do so.

Presentations and papers will be evaluated through the following research ingredients:

- 1) A clear statement of your research question.
- 2) An explanation of its importance (use numbers).
- 3) A description of the market and/or policy you examine.
- 4) Your synthesis of the relevant literature with references.
- 5) Potential data sources that you can and do use.
- 6) A theoretical explanation of the main relationships.
- 7) Your identifying variation and empirical strategy.
- 8) The visualization of your evidence (figures and tables).
- 9) Your original contribution to the economics literature.

Grammarly software is also available to help clean up your presentations and papers.
